Final evaluation report seminars

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Abstract (for dissemination)	This evaluation report takes a closer look at the methodological EHRI Seminars conducted in EHRI-3 between 2022 and 2024. The report also includes a statistical analysis of the Seminar's participants' professional and regional background as well as brief recommendations for the future of EHRI Seminars in EHRI-ERIC.	
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1 Introduction

A series of nine methodological EHRI Seminars was held during the EHRI-3 project. These Seminars were co-organized and hosted by a total of nine EHRI partner institutions (INSHR-EW, USHMM, CUH, VWI, JMP, IfZ, AA, BArch, SCBnZZ) and took place in five European countries: Romania (Bucharest), Poland (Łódź), Czechia (Prague), Austria (Vienna), and Germany (Berlin, Frankfurt am Main, Bad Arolsen). All these Seminars addressed current approaches to Holocaust research, documentation and education, in most cases from a European and interdisciplinary perspective.

EHRI Seminars lasted up to five days, invite an average of twelve people and followed a similar structure: Each Seminar included an introduction to the overall EHRI project (including the process of becoming a permanent and distributed Research Infrastructure), as well as the EHRI services and activities, with particular emphasis on an introduction to the EHRI Portal, the Conny Kristel Fellowship Programme, the EHRI Document Blog and others. They included presentations and lectures, hands-on sessions, keynote speeches, and tours of relevant archives, museums, memorials, and historical sites related to the Holocaust. All Seminar locations bore a significant link to the history of the Holocaust and/or its aftermath. EHRI Seminars were normally conducted in English, but certain elements of the programme may have been delivered in local languages. Participants had to apply in advance to attend. Applicants were required to complete a standard application form, and to submit a CV and a letter of motivation. Candidates would be selected in cooperation between the hosting EHRI partner institution and the Work Package Lead. At the beginning of the project, each hosting institution was granted a specific budget for the organisation of the event. EHRI covered travel expenses, accommodation and meals.

This Deliverable takes a closer look at the nine EHRI Seminars organized during the EHRI-3 project between 2022 and 2024. It provides a statistical analysis of the professional and regional background of the participants, contrasts these figures with the objectives of WP5, and concludes with an outlook focusing on the sustainability of EHRI Seminars once EHRI-ERIC is in place.



2 EHRI Seminars 2022-2024

2.1 CUH: Documenting the War. Past and Present; 3-7 October 2022 (Online)

As described in more detail in D5.1, the first Seminar of EHRI-3 was held as an online Seminar due to the full-scale Russian invasion of Ukraine. The event addressed the challenges of working with Holocaust and World War II material in the context of the ongoing Russian war against Ukraine.

2.2 INSHR-EW/USHMM: A Multilevel Approach to the Holocaust in Romania. Research and Resources; 2-4 November 2022

The second event of the EHRI Seminar series, jointly organised by the EHRI partner institutions INSHR-EW and USHMM, focused on methods, sources, current research topics and approaches to the Holocaust in Romania. This was the first in-person Seminar after the start of the Covid-19 pandemic. More information on the Seminar can also be found in D5.1.

2.3 JMP/lfZ: Engaging Educators, 7-11 August 2023

Although the event described in this section is not part of T5.1 but of T5.2, it shall be listed next to the standard EHRI methodological Seminars and therefore be part of the analysis of this DL. 'Engaging Educators', jointly organised by JMP (who hosted the event in Prague) and IfZ, was an EHRI Seminar specifically tailored for educators teaching the Holocaust. The strong interest and demand within the educator community was very clearly reflected in the high number of applications (143), which was the largest for any EHR Seminar so far. In this Seminar, the EHRI services were actively and constructively discussed with this new EHRI user group. Other elements of the event included the IHRA's teaching recommendations, a discussion of IfZ's "The Persecution and Murder of the European Jews by Nazi Germany" (PMJ) edition project, and a workshop by Centropa, an organisation with which EHRI intends to work more closely in the future. The Seminar included guided tours of the historic Jewish quarter in Prague and excursions to Terezín and Lidice. The 17 participants came from a variety of professional backgrounds and experiences in the field of Holocaust education. After the event, one participant reflected: 'Researchers engaging with educators and vice versa: academics and teachers working hand in hand, teaching and learning from each other. Unfortunately, we do not have too many opportunities for this (academics and high schools, the two should rarely meet).'

2.4 BArch: Modern Diplomatics of the Holocaust, 10-15 September 2023

Twelve participants from Austria, Germany, Czechia, Hungary, Russia, Serbia, Switzerland and the United States were invited to the Berlin-Lichterfelde branch of BArch to attend the Seminar 'Modern Diplomatics of the Holocaust'. The Seminar explored diplomatics as a tool for historical research. Under the guidance of archivists and researchers, the participants



were able to work closely with administrative, personal and military documents as well as photographs held at the BArch Berlin-Lichterfelde. The programme also included visits to the Topography of Terror Memorial and the House of the Wannsee Conference. 'Go on with your important work and education on the Holocaust & antisemitism, especially in these times of rising nationalism and right-wing political parties', a participant wrote in the evaluation form and therefore underscored the relevance of EHRI's methodological Seminars given current political developments in Europe and beyond.

2.5 SCBnZZ: Microhistories of the Holocaust, 18-22 September 2023

SCBnZZ and the Center for Jewish Research at the University of Lodz jointly organised the methodological Seminar 'Microhistories of the Holocaust - Methodology, Sources, Challenges, Impact'. During the five-day Seminar in Lodz, scholars from Europe, Israel and the USA learned about the methodology of microhistory in Holocaust Studies and the transfer of knowledge from researchers to educators, remembrance projects and the public. Participants discussed methodological challenges in their research, such as how to use different resources, and the impact of history on local communities. The EHRI Seminar not only provided insights into current research, but also, as one participant pointed out after the event, helped to make new connections. Indeed, the EHRI Seminars are intended not only as a learning platform but also as a transnational networking space.

2.6 VWI: What's new in Austrian Holocaust Studies?, 15-19 January 2024

Organised by VWI, the first EHRI Seminar in 2024 took place in Vienna. The Seminar focused on digital methods in Holocaust research in Austria, and several partners from the National Node EHRI-AT were invited to present projects on the topics of geo-referenced Holocaust-related data, Holocaust-related databases or visual sources, and dealing with the primary source of photographs. Participants - including archivists, researchers and digital humanists - came from Israel, the USA, Sweden, Romania, the Czech Republic and Austria. In break-out sessions they were able to deepen their knowledge, for example on how to use the previously presented databases for their own research. Two guided tours through the first district of Vienna completed the programme. The feedback was very positive, as reflected in one statement: 'A bringing together of dynamic thinkers and doers across a range of fields offering a wide scope of insightful and innovative perspectives around the topic.'. Another participant added: 'EHRI is a great source and resource to use in Holocaust research, education and exhibition work. It connects the experts in the field.'



2.7 INSHR-EW/UHSMM 2: Recent Research, Resources, and Holocaust Memory in Romania, 20-22 February 2024

Yet another methodological EHRI Seminar was jointly organized by INSHR-EW and the USHMM in Bucharest. The specificities of the Holocaust in Bessarabia, Bukovina, Transnistria and Northern Transylvania as well as public debates on the legal framework of citizenship for Romanian Jews or the implementation of antisemitic legislation were part of the discussions during this three-day Seminar. The participants constituted a heterogeneous group at different stages of their careers: masters and doctoral students, post-doctoral researchers, museum professionals and educators. At the Diplomatic Archives of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Romania, they had the opportunity to gain an insight into the history of repositories and collections of Holocaust-related material. As one participant summarised: 'I am very glad to have taken part in the EHRI methodological Seminar. The Seminar brought together established scholars and young academics, together with educators and museum curators. This diversity of experiences and research paths allowed for fruitful discussions and precious exchanges of knowledge and histories. The study of the Holocaust in Romania has entered a stage of expansion, with broader thematic and theoretical scopes. These Seminars are thus very important in connecting researchers working in different countries and continents, who can explore together the new directions of research, methodologies, and questions.'

2.8 IfZ: Holocaust and Exile, 4-7 November 2024

In cooperation between IfZ and the German Exile Archive 1933-1945 (DEA) at the German National Library, the EHRI Seminar 'Holocaust and Exile - Approaches, Sources, Methodologies' took place from 4 to 7 November in Frankfurt am Main. During the four-day Seminar, 13 participants, many of them researchers and archivists from Italy, Austria, Germany, Israel, Serbia and Portugal, discussed the connection between Holocaust and Exile Studies. Two hands-on sessions focused on exile sources: Participants worked closely with primary archival sources from the DEA on Jewish exiles giving insights into the entanglement between Exile and Holocaust. The second session offered a peek into the methodology of the #everynamecounts campaign, developed and implemented by EHRI partner AA, with a special focus on the Reichsausbürgerungskartei (Reich Expatriation Index), which is part of the DEA's holdings. Guided tours of the DEA's permanent and temporary exhibitions, as well as the Jewish Museum in Frankfurt, provided participants with practical and pedagogical approaches to the topic of Holocaust and Exile. A public keynote lecture by historian Wolfgang Benz, who is currently writing a book on the German exile, provided valuable insights into current research perspectives. The Seminar was overwhelmingly positively perceived. One participant reflected: 'The event was a powerful



experience that deepened my understanding of exile and the Holocaust, offering valuable insights that I can now apply in my teaching.'

2.9 AA: Citizen Science in the Archival Domain. A Hands-On Seminar on Implementing Crowdsourcing Projects for Micro-Archives, 25-28 November 2024

Seven participants, most of them archivists or data specialists, took part in this practical EHRI Seminar offered by AA. In addition to a guided tour through the institution's extensive archives, participants were given an overview of EHRI and AA's holdings and activities. The hands-on Seminar focused on how to develop own crowdsourcing projects for micro-archives and micro-archival collections, using the example of the #everynamecounts campaign developed and conducted by the AA. Participants not only learned about the opportunities and challenges of crowdsourcing projects, but were also given the opportunity to create their own crowdsourcing workflow. As one participant put it: 'Now we can assess much better how much effort is involved.' This EHRI Seminar was also conducted in the framework of WP11, which offered a special workshop series tailored to micro-archives.

3 Evaluation of regional and professional background of participants (9 Seminars 2022-2024)

Between 2022 and 2024, 106 participants attended the EHRI Seminar Series. As can be seen in the graph below, more than a third (40 people) were affiliated with Western European countries.¹ However, cumulatively, this number is exceeded by participants that EHRI specifically sought to engage with, namely from Eastern (25, 24%), Southern (13, 12%) and Northern (7, 7%) Europe. It should be noted, however, that a considerable number of participants affiliated with institutions located in Western European countries have an Eastern European national background. The actual number of participants coming from Eastern Europe is therefore much higher. A look at the number of participants from North America (11, 10%) and Israel (8, 8%) shows that EHRI's outreach goes beyond Europe.




Image 1: Graph illustrating EHRI Seminar participants by region

The graph on the professional background of the participants reveals that the EHRI Seminars have largely attracted the attention of researchers who already completed their PhDs (32 people, 30%). This rather heterogeneous group consists of senior researchers, assistant professors, lecturers, heads of departments and others, and is followed by roughly equal numbers of PhD students (24, 23%), educators (23, 22%) and people working in reference services (22, 21%), another heterogeneous group consisting of archivists, curators, librarians and data specialists. Taken together, these make up two thirds, and therefore by far the largest group of EHRI Seminar attendees. These figures demonstrate the success of the series, as EHRI has aimed to support younger scholars and to also include people working in non-research positions. The large number of educators, a user group that has been underrepresented in previous EHRI projects, is due to the 'Engaging Educators' Seminar (JMP/IfZ), which specifically targeted educators who teach about the Holocaust. Overall, the graph shows the mixed profile of EHRI's user group in terms of profession and academic background and therefore once again reflects the initial aims of the project.






Image 2: Graph illustrating EHRI Seminar participants by professional background

4 Conclusion and outlook

The beginning of EHRI-3's Seminar Series was influenced by international crises: The Covid-19 pandemic made on-site events impossible, and the full-scale Russian invasion of Ukraine prevented EHRI partner CUH from conducting the Seminar they had originally outlined and made access to EHRI events more difficult for potential Ukrainian participants. Notwithstanding these major obstacles, the partners in WP5 have, since 2022, conducted another very diverse EHRI Seminar series, which has attracted a high level of attention within the research community and beyond, and has generated new user groups. The desire expressed at the end of EHRI-2 for further engagement with educators has been met, as the figures presented in Chapter 3 clearly show. In addition, the Seminars played an important role in fulfilling EHRI's goal of providing access to users from countries with limited availability of resources and funding. Application numbers for the EHRI Seminars were constantly high and the feedback from the participants was generally very positive, reflecting EHRI's important role as a provider of on-site learning and networking platforms. Another very positive finding of this Seminar Series results from its co-operational aspect: Several Seminars co-hosted by EHRI partner institutions have created synergies and capacities to organise and host excellent events. Further thought could be given to the size of the group of participants during the Seminars, as, looking at the AA's Seminar, smaller hands-on workshops have proved very practical compared to larger events where discussions are often dominated by individuals.



Over the course of the three EHRI projects, EHRI has been a key provider of methodological Seminars, attracting considerable attention of a diverse user group. The provision of methodological guidance, insights into current research findings, debates and trends, and networking opportunities will continue to be important. In the future, the administrative organization of transnational EHRI Seminars will be the responsibility of the Central Hub. The establishment of a transnational Working Group for institutions participating in future EHRI Seminar series could help to streamline efforts, share best practices and build a framework, taking advantage of the methodological competences and expertise that each institution can offer. In addition, and if national funds are available, National Nodes will have the opportunity to organise and deliver EHRI-branded Seminars on their own thematic and methodological priorities.²


